This course will focus on a major theme found in the mythologies of nearly every major (and minor) world religious tradition: the hero's quest. This common theme appears in the narratives of religions as different as the animism of the Trobriand islanders to the strict monotheism of Islam. While the details differ, representations of the hero's quest follow a remarkably similar pattern across time and distance. We will examine this pattern step by step as it appears in various religious narratives. We will also see how people are still today telling this story, in new ways, with new characters and new adventures, adapting it to contemporary life. In movies, fiction writing, and TV, we humans continue to travel the path of the hero.

Through comparing these popular versions of the hero's quest to those found in formal religious traditions, we will explore the role that this theme plays in human society, both past and present, local and universal. As well as finding commonalities, we will also discover what differs among versions of this story, and think about and discuss what these differences might mean. At a general level, we will explore three types of belief systems: Western (Judaism, Christianity, Islam), Eastern (Hinduism, Buddhism, and Taoism), and Native North American.

Learning Goals

Upon successful completion of the course, students will:

- have a comparative understanding of the basic characteristics of major world religions'
- have a firm grasp of the genre of the hero myth, and be able to analyze its role in communicating religious ideals and creating meaning out of a chaotic world
- be able to identify contemporary manifestations of the hero myth, especially in fantasy novels and films, and evaluate their role in contemporary society

Course Requirements and Grading:

Students are required to keep a nearly-weekly blog on the course Sakai site. There will be a new question most weeks about that week's material, and will ask students to consider various conceptual themes presented in class or in course texts. Blog questions and dates will be given in class and posted on Sakai. There will also be a series of three short tests that will consist of short essay questions, and a final short paper that will ask students to choose one or more of the theoretical concepts presented in the course and apply it to one hero myth of a formal religion, and one example of a contemporary interpretation of the hero myth in literature, film or TV.
