#### **Course Description:**

This course will introduce the Hindu, Buddhist and Chinese religious traditions through close readings of four primary texts: the *Bhagavad-gītā*, the *Dhammapada*, the *Tao Te Ching*, and the *Mengzi*.

**Course Requirements**: adequate preparation of assigned primary texts and supplementary readings, demonstrated by thoughtful contributions to **class discussion** and **short response papers** as assigned; **three comprehensive, in-class quizzes** based on assigned readings and class lectures; a **final 5-6 page paper** due the last day of class. Regular participation in classroom discussion is expected.

**Grading**: Grades will be based on **three quizzes** and a **final exam** in the exam period following the end of term (60%), an **8-page paper** (20%) and classroom participation, including occasional, short response papers (20%). Students will be called upon in class to answer questions pertaining to the week's reading, as well as participate in discussion. No make-ups for missed exams will be given without valid medical proof or a signed letter from a student dean. Extra credit may be earned through in-class presentations.
